

JAMES CHALMERS CAMERON, M.D.

Born at Aultsville, Ontario, January 18, 1852. Honorary Fellow, 1910.

Studied at Upper Canada College, Toronto, where he was head boy in 1870. He next entered McGill Medical College, graduating in 1874 with first prize. Later he spent three years at the Montreal General Hospital.

In April, 1877, he went to the Rotunda at Dublin and subsequently to Berlin, Paris, and Vienna. In 1880 he was appointed to the chair of obstetrics in Bishops' College and in 1886 to the chair in the same subject in McGill. He held this professorship in McGill for twenty-six years. While professor at McGill, Dr. Cameron became associated with the old University Lying-in Hospital, which later became the Montreal Maternity Hospital.

He was a member of the British Medical Association and the Edinburgh Obstetrical Society. He was a 32d degree Mason, and at the time of his death was worshipful master of University Lodge, A. F. and A. M., and an officer of the Grand Lodge of Quebec.

It was not only as practitioner and educator that Dr. Cameron became widely known, but also as a contributor to various textbooks on medicine. His treatises were written in English, French, and German.

Died, March 16, 1912.
