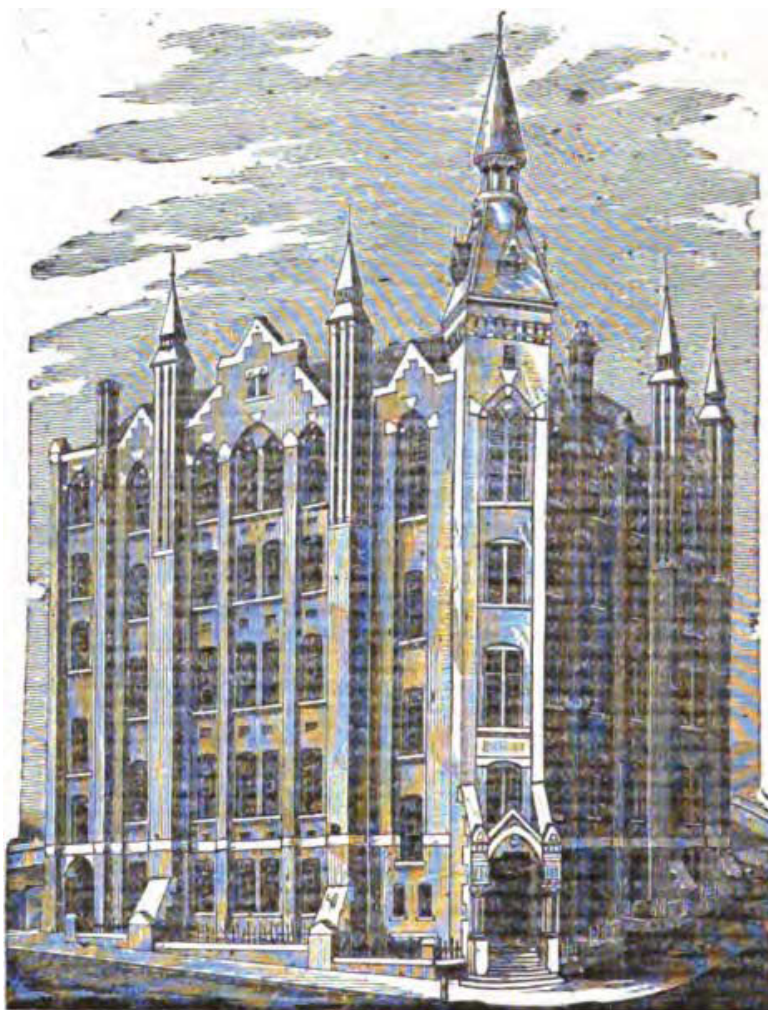

## THE COLLEGE.

The College building, the gift of Prof. Lane, is an imposing brick and stone structure, 5 stories and basement in height, and having a frontage of 80 feet on each of two streets. On the different floors are found macerat-

ing, furnace and store rooms; drug store, general and special clinical rooms waiting rooms, lecture rooms, amphitheatre, laboratories, reading, library and magazine rooms, anatomical and pathological museums, microscopic room, dissecting rooms, etc., which are supplied with all modern conveniences.

**THE THREE YEAR CURRICULUM** is adopted by this College; attendance upon three Regular Courses,—at least one in this Institution, being obligatory. A Matriculating Examination or other evidence of the possession of a fair English education will be required on entering.

**THE REGULAR COURSE** commences on the first Monday of June of each year, and continues until November. It is thus a Summer Course, contrary to general usage. In San Francisco the disadvantages attendant upon such a plan do not exist. The heat is never oppressive or enervating; on the contrary, the sea winds are bracing and invigorating. There are no rains during the lecture months; the atmosphere is dry, and the temperature rarely above 70°, while it ranges considerably lower. These circumstances tend to prevent decomposition, and add many advantages to the prosecution of dissection.

**THE INTERMEDIATE COURSE** commences early in January of each year, and continues nearly four months. It is a great assistance as a preparatory step to the Regular Course, and as offering the fullest opportunities for the prosecution of dissections. Although attendance upon this course is not obligatory, it is earnestly recommended that all attend it who can possibly do so.

**CLINICS** are given regularly at the City and County Hospital (450 beds) and the Morse Dispensary, where several thousands of patients are treated annually.

**DISSECTING** may be prosecuted during the entire year. Material is abundant, and through climatic influences and proper preparation its decomposition is so retarded as to permit the most deliberate study of anatomy.

No charge is made for the third course of lectures. A charge of \$25 will be made on entering at the Intermediate course, which however will be deducted from the fee for the succeeding Regular Course.

#### REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

1. The candidate must be of good moral character and at least twenty-one years of age.
2. He must have attended three Regular Courses of Medical Lectures, at least one of which must have been delivered in this institution, and two Courses of Clinical Instruction. Attendance upon the Intermediate Course alone will not fill the conditions of this requirement.
3. He must have attended at least one Course of Practical Anatomy in the Dissecting Room and present evidence of having dissected the entire subject.
4. He must write a Medical Thesis and submit the same to the Faculty on or before the 10th of October.
5. He must have successfully passed the examination required by the Faculty and have paid all fees due the College.

Students may obtain good rooms and board at prices varying from five to ten dollars per week.
