


Chairman 1874 - 1888



- Born in Maine, 1834. Classic Harvard education.
- M.D. 1859, New York. Influenced by E.R. Peaslee, renowned ovariotomist.
- Interned St Luke's, NY, then private practice.
- 1861–1866: Military surgeon. Skilled administrator.
 Rapid promotion. Surgeon West Point
- 1866-1871: Editor New York Medical Journal.
 Inaugurated abstracts of current literature.
- 1866-1872: Multiple appointments, mostly Children's diseases, Bellevue Hospital, Long Island College Hospital, Infant Hospital NY. Exhaustion.

- 1873: U of M Lecturer Obstetrics and Disease of Women and Children.
- 1874: Replaced Sager as Chairman

- Acquired reputation as brilliant lecturer.
- Despite skill as writer, published only 15 papers.
- Died pneumonia 1888, age 54





The Maternity Ward, first lying-in unit of the University Hospital, used for deliveries and postpartum patients from 1906 to 1925.














View of the Norman R. Kretzschmar Galen Memorial Room, to be devoted to formal and informal medical student gatherings.





• Although I had considered applying for an appointment in Urology, I finished my senior year by applying for and being accepted on the gynecology and obstetrics service under Dr. Reuben Peterson.1920

It was when I was scheduled to perform my first hysterectomy that I had trouble...A midline vertical incision was made in the abdomen ---and much to my surprise, into the bladder...Dr. Sturmdorf was in the audience...

We had scarcely [returned to Ann Arbor when the crash came and the banks folded. We lost our home, our only investment---the equity...Those were the dark days...1931

Index invitation to demonstrate cesarean section under local anesthesia...Little did they realize that I had not previously used local in performing abdominal delivery...If I do say so, it took a bit of guts to enter the circular arena without having an opportunity to rehearse my part...




 During my early years in practice...I devoted considerable effort to pediatrics...

Especially rewarding was the opportunity to train interns and residents in our field. I believed they should aim high and consequently may have been too much of a disciplinarian.

• One of the greatest pleasures I have is to attend the annual meetings of the Norman F. Miller Gynecological Society to meet again with former residents and take pride in their successful careers... Over a baker's dozen have become chairmen.....If I were to list all these men and women and their accomplishments, it would be a miniature "Who's Who" in obstetrics and gynecology.

I had several of my colleagues suffer the ignominy and unhappy emotional turmoil of being informed they could no longer have operating room privileges, and I did not want that to happen to me.



U. of M. books called sexist

Women radicals unite to burn medical texts

ANN ARBOR — A coalition of radical feminists, lesbians and homosexuals burned four allegedly sexist medical textbooks in a noontime ceremony on the University of Michigan's famed Diagonal yesterday.

A university spokesman said the book burning is believed to be the first such occurrence in the school's 156-year-old history.

About 150 students paused to watch the bizarre ritual which also featured a guerilla theatre presentation on the plight of the homosexual and the hurning of two decks of playing cards illustrated with nude male models.

The crowd's reaction was mixed throughout the 45-minute performance. Most applauded the guerilla theater, but about half hissed when the books were set allame. The prevailing mood, however, was one of curiosity and amusement.

There was little outright hostility, however.

KAY WEISS, CHAIRMAN of Advocates for Medical Information (AMI) which co-sponsored the event with the Gay-Liberation Front and Radical Lesbians, said its purpose was to dramatize what she called "the health-damaging lies put forth in these textbooks."

Miss Weiss, a U. of. M, senior, singled out "Obstrctics and Gynecology," a widely used medical-text authored by Dr. J. Robert Wilson, U. of M. professor, and two of his former colleagues at Temple University.

"This book is so, sexist that it verges on Nazism." she said, shortly before putting it to the torch.

Miss Weiss said she paid \$22 for the text at an Ann Arbor bookstore, even though the book's listed retail price is \$18.75.

Also burned were Dr. Russell C. Scott's "The World of the Gynecologist" and "Male Homosexuality: 'A Psycho-Analytic View," by Dr. Irving Bieber. Miss Weiss described "Obstretics and Gynecology" as 'a male fantasy about a child like, helpless creature with an animal-like nature... a creature unable to cope.

"This book is criminal," she yelled as she ripped pages out of the text and tossed them into a blazing trash can.

Objectionable passages, she said, included such statements as:

• "The normal sexual act... entails a masochistic surrender to the man... there is always an element of rape.

"Every phase of a woman's life is influenced by narcissism."

"Every aspect of a woman's life is colored by her ability to accept the masochism that is part of her feminine role.

• "Sexually she must be passive and receptive."

MISS WEISS SAID her group called for the book burning "because we wanted to show doctors as well as women that these books encourage medical misinformation and malpractice.

"Young, male medical students reading these books would get the impression that all female headaches and gynecological problems are emotionally based," she said.

A spokesman for C. V. Mosby, the St. Louis publisher of "Obstretics and Gynecology," however, said Miss Weiss' charges are not based on fact.

"The statements she attributes to the book are either terribly misquoted or taken out of context to such an extent that they lose their real meaning," he said.

"She's trumped up a case to suit her own viewpoint."

Dr. Willson, chairman of obstretics and gynecology at the U. of M.'s University Hospital, and, ironically, a leader in the state's abortion-reform movement, declined comment on Miss Weiss' attack.
